



In a world where English is a tool of communication, it can be ironically difficult for native speakers to separate the tool from the mother tongue when needing to communicate with various levels of speakers.

## Answers:

- I. recipe: doctors give a 'prescription' for medication. 'Recipe' means the instructions you use when cooking.
- 2. eat: in English we 'eat' food but 'take' vitamins or medicine.
- 3. restaurant: restaurants are places where you specifically eat food. A nightclub (for example) is where you dance and party.
- 4. living: living is for a longer time, for example I <u>live</u> in Helsinki but when I visited Stockholm I stayed at a hotel.
- 5. keep: In English we 'have' a meeting. If you are hosting a meeting you can also say 'hold' a meeting.
- 6. 2,5: In English the decimal place should be a point, 2.5 hours.
- 7. see: In English we 'have' dreams not 'see' them. Think of Martin Luther King saying, "I have a dream".



## **Answers:**

- 8. the other: if there are two choices you can't start by calling the first one 'the other'. Correct options would be: 'One is more efficient and the other more economical.' Or 'The first is more efficient and the second is more economical.'
- 9. salty: salty snacks are things where you can taste the salt, like peanuts or chips. The English word for food that isn't sweet is 'savoury'.
- 10. eighteenth century: in English the 1800s are the nineteenth century. We are now living in the twenty-first century.
- II. raining water: in English it 'rains' or it 'snows' it doesn't 'rain water' or 'rain snow'.
- 12. promise: a 'promise' is something you say you will do and 'permission' is to allow someone to do something.





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
